Educational Aims

The BSc (Hons) in Dental Hygiene and Dental Therapy Programme aims to:

 underpinning knowledge, concepts, principles and theories related to the role and practices of
 the registered dental therapist and dental hygienist.
- Provide opportunities for dental team integration and effective team working.
- Develop students' critical, analytical, practical, research and communication skills.
- Prepare students for employment, postgraduate study and career development.
- Develop in students the skills necessary for life-long independent learning, and the acquisition of knowledge to engender an awareness of the needs for these skills.
- Develop students to attain the highest standards in terms of knowledge, skills, (including clinical and technical skills), and professional attributes, in particular putting the interests of patients first at all times.

The skills required of registrants are covered in the following domains:

Clinical – the range of skills required to deliver direct care, where registrants interact with patients, and also the essential technical skills, carried out in the absence of patients which support their care.

Communication – the skills involved in effectively interacting with patients, their representatives, the public and colleagues and recording appropriate information to inform patient care.

Professionalism – the knowledge, skills and attitudes/behaviours required to practise in an ethical and appropriate way, putting patients' needs first and promoting confidence in the dental team.

Management and Leadership – the skills and knowledge required to work effectively as a dental team, manage their own time and resources and contribute to professional practices
