Educational aims of the course

The course aims to prepare graduates through a combination of academic study at Level 7 and compulsory practice placements for eligibility to apply to register as a social worker with the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) or (as planned from 2019) Social Work England.

In general the course aims to:

- Provide an opportunity for students to achieve a professional qualification in social work.
- Provide a stimulating study environment which will equip students to make evidence informed decisions and assessments which integrate practice and academic elements.
- Enable students to develop and apply knowledge and skills in a variety of social work settings and agencies.
- Test the students' capability within the frameworks of the Professional Capability Framework, HCPC Standards of Proficiency and Standards of Conduct, Performance and Ethics (2017) and the Social Work Subject Benchmark Statement (2016).
- Provide the opportunity for students to gain experience in working with and applying social work theories and methods in at least two distinctive service user areas during their compulsory placements.
- Ensure that students have knowledge and skills in the specific areas of inclusion and inter-professional practice, and understand the international context for social work.
- Equip students to identify, understand and take action to tackle all areas of discrimination and oppression impacting on service users and carers, marginalised groups and social workers.
- Equip graduates with the necessary transferable skills to ensure that they can adhere to continuous professional development standards and contribute to the development of the profession.
- Provide the intellectual engagement necessary to ensure that on successfully completing the course students will be able to make a significant contribution to the agencies and the services users/carers with whom they work.
- Enable students to synthesise theory and practice and develop analytical and critical perspectives on social work.
- Create reflective practitioners with a clear value and ethical base.
- Provide students with an integrated curriculum which ensures that they can engage in high standards of practice.
- Ensure that students have the graduate and employability skills necessary to work in the current practice environment.
- Prepare students to be eligible to apply for registration with the HCPC (or Social Work England) at the point of qualification.
