- To provide students with knowledge and understanding of the diversity of development experiences throughout the Global South using a range of appropriate disciplinary or interdisciplinary approaches.
- To equip students with the conceptual and theoretical knowledge and skills necessary to be able to critically appraise key approaches in contemporary development policy and practice.
- To enable students to acquire an informed sense of the similarities and differences between regions of the world, situated within a critical understanding of contemporary global development challenges, thus fostering cross-cultural and global perspectives.
- To equip students with a global perspective, fostering informed citizenship and promoting diversity and respect. This includes providing opportunities for international exchange and work placement, as well as fostering awareness of global ethical practice and social justice issues.
- To equip graduates with the necessary transferable skills for lifelong learning and flexibility in the context of changing, global labour markets.
- To provide students with the skills and knowledge required to maximize careers and postgraduate study opportunities.
- To provide opportunities for students to gain experience and skills relevant to employment (or further study) within the international development sector by choosing relevant work placement/work based learning/study options.
