- To develop technical skills and understanding that can be applied to both current and emerging photographic technology
- To produce outcomes which successfully combine conceptual, theoretical and practical elements.
- Be able to communicate clearly and effectively, in a range of forms and to different audiences.
- Be able to work in a range of environments, responding positively to new situations by being aware, flexible, adaptable and realistic in their expectations.
- Demonstrate a global perspective, fostering informed citizenship and promoting diversity and respect.
- To develop intellectual maturity, curiosity, personal innovation, risk-taking and independent enquiry.
- To encourage and prepare students to take increasing responsibility for the content and direction of their creative work, and require students to undertake significant and sustained periods of independent study.
- Be effective team players, able to provide leadership and to support the success of others
- To foster students' employability skills by developing the students' creative, intellectual, analytical and research skills.
- To develop critical and creative independence, flexibility, sensitivity to audience, and self-reflexiveness, across individual and group work, and critical and production work.
- To develop the ability to use a range of research methods within the historical, theoretical and socio-political dimensions of their and then produce logical and structured narratives and arguments supported by relevant evidence.
- Be proactive in recognising and addressing personal development needs, and able to make informed career decisions.
