Educational aims of the course

The Senior Journalist Degree Apprenticeship is a practical course which will equip you with a wide range of technical skills required to be a digital journalist in today's fast-moving industry. The course encourages individual, creative approaches to all forms of reporting, from news reporting and feature writing to investigative and data journalism. While developing your practical skills, you will explore the theoretical debates relevant to journalism and learn what it takes to become a senior leader in the newsroom. Alongside your apprenticeship, you will earn credits towards achieving a Master's and the Level 6 National Qualification in Journalism.
