- To provide a conceptual understanding to enable critical evaluation of current research and advanced scholarship in Sociology
- To equip students with the tools to evaluate methodologies and develop critiques of them and, where appropriate, to propose new research questions.
- To foster the opportunity for students to practise initiative and personal responsibility, and the
 individual learning skills required for continuing professional development, including the
 enhancement of transferable skills for lifelong learning and graduate employment in the context
 of changing labour markets.
- To encourage critical thinking about a range of social problems in a global context, and creative solutions to make a positive difference to society.
