Educational aims of the course

To develop graduates equipped with the necessary skills and qualities to take roles within the Civil Engineering industry as professional engineers, and to provide an educational foundation upon which graduate engineers can build with further learning and experience in order to achieve higher professional status and responsibility.

Develop knowledge of professional and ethical responsibility of Civil Engineers and adopt inclusive approaches to engineering practice. • Engineering practice (AHEP references:C12, C13, C14, C15, C16, C17 & C18)

Investigate cutting edge practices in civil engineering including fieldwork, laboratory skills, and materials selection, project planning management and implementation and todevelop an awareness of quality issues. Develop effective interpersonal, communication and general skills for professional and career development.
