Educational aims of the course

Develop the knowledge and skills required for a career in Operating Department Practice including providing evidence-based decisions to support perioperative patient care and transferable skills to facilitate personal development.

Develop critical, analytical, practical, professional, research and communication skills necessary for a patient-centred approach to care and life-long independent learning and acquisition of knowledge and the use of evidence to inform practice.

Develop ability to demonstrate leadership and clinical reasoning as a member of a multidisciplinary team and have the capacity to evaluate own performance and the performance of peers and students by identifying strengths and weaknesses through reflection.

Ensure that all statutory requirements are met in order to be eligible to apply for HCPC registration as an Operating Department Practitioner.

Develop the ability to become an independent and autonomous perioperative care practitioner using independent/autonomous decision making.

Evaluation and Enhancement of Standards and Quality in Learning and Teaching

Quality Monitoring of placements currently occurs via a 2 yearly audit process along with an annual placement update. As a course team we also meet with practice partners on a quarterly basis in the format of a Clinical Liaison Group. This process ensures that there is continued communication between the provider and the academic team. All clinical placements have been audited and meet the quality standards and have a workplace agreement in place.

The Associate Head for Clinical Placements within the School will oversee placement provision within the school to ensure that quality standards and procedures are met in line with changing national standards and school policies and procedures.

Apprenticeship information

Occupation Summary

Operating department practitioners are registered healthcare professionals specialising in caring for people of all ages before, during and after surgery. Operating department practitioners, therefore, mainly work in operating departments. They work alongside other professionals, such as doctors and nurses, and take a lead role in ensuring the service user is safe during each stage of the journey through the operating theatre. Operating department practitioners must continually make professional decisions to ensure the service user receives the best care. Operating department practitioners also ensure that the operating theatre environment is safe and effective and, therefore, have expertise in the management of specialist equipment and materials in a highly technical environment; for example, handling surgical instruments, checking anaesthetic equipment, moving individuals, and giving medication. Operating department practitioners must be confident, compassionate, competent and make effective judgements, for which they are accountable. They must use evidence-based practice to inform and evaluate the effectiveness of their actions with the aim of continually improving outcomes for service users. They are responsible for ensuring their own professional knowledge and skills through continuous professional development (CPD) and supporting the development of others.

Skills Scan

Each year students will be required to complete a Skills scan which will be linked to the apprenticeship standard. This will be repeated year on year and will provide a visual representation and evidence of progression.

Tripartite Meetings

Regular experiential and progress reviews of the apprentice will be facilitated by the Workbased tutor at a minimum of every 12 weeks. The review will monitor:
